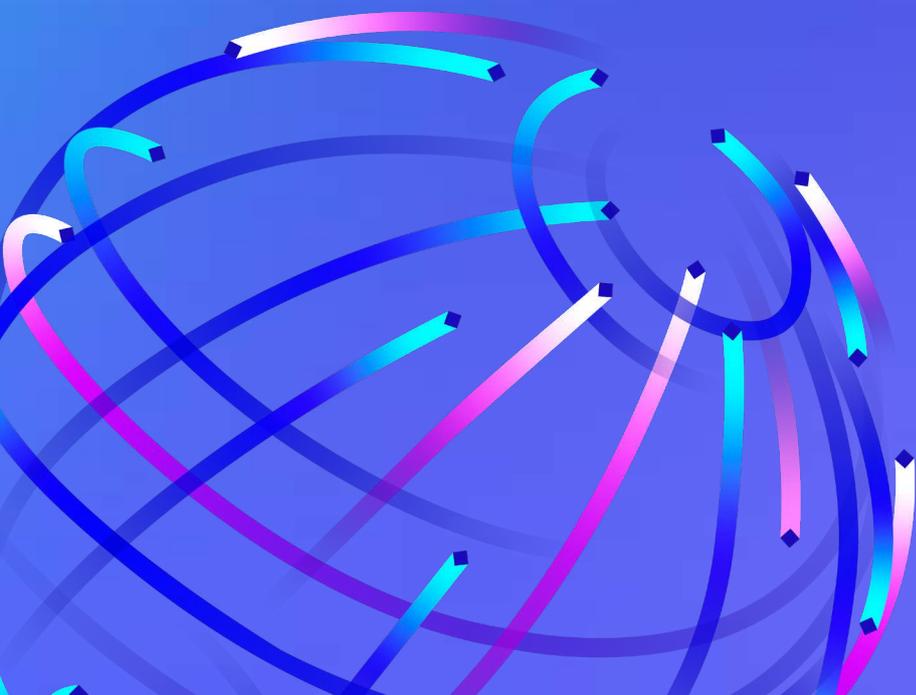

Empathy

The ability to understand the emotional makeup of others.



Social skills

Proficiency in managing relationships, building networks, and building positive interactions.

Unlike technical skills, EI is more subjective and can be harder to measure accurately.



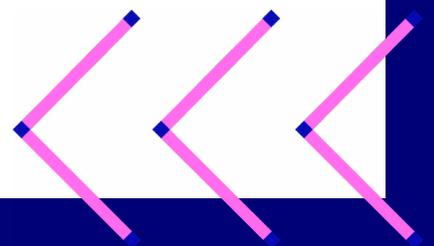
Misleading Indicators

How to Measure EI in Candidates

Evaluating emotional intelligence during the recruitment process can be challenging, but several techniques can help identify EI traits in candidates:

Behavioural Interviewing

Ask candidates situational or behavioural questions that require them to demonstrate their ability to handle emotions, conflicts, and teamwork. Examples include: "Can you tell me about a time when you had to resolve a conflict in the workplace?" or "How do you handle stressful situations?"

Psychometric Testing

Tools like the EQ-i 2.0 can provide scientific assessments of a candidate's emotional intelligence, offering valuable insights into their emotional and interpersonal skills.

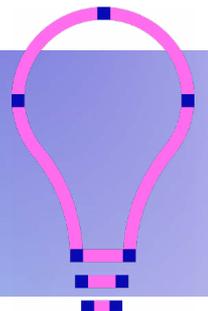
Reference Checking

Asking previous employers specific questions about the candidate's emotional management, team interactions, and ability to handle difficult situations can provide real-world evidence of their EI.

Workplace Simulations

Use real-life scenarios or simulations where candidates must navigate interpersonal dynamics, manage stress, or resolve conflicts. Observing their behaviour in such situations can reveal critical EI traits.

High-EI teams work more harmoniously, resulting in higher productivity levels. Fewer conflicts and smoother communication mean that projects progress more efficiently.

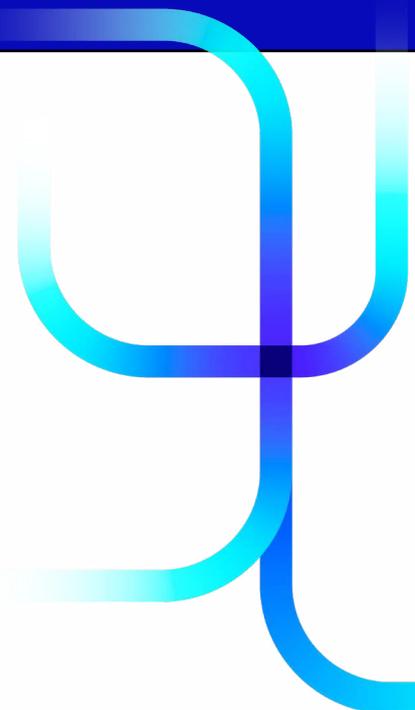


Adaptability and Innovation
